TIPS FOR A SUCCESSFUL EVENT



Prepare a budget well in advance of the grant application deadline. Be sure to include specific expenses for your program or event.



Use S.M.A.R.T. Goals to make your project meaningful. S.M.A.R.T. goals stand for **S**pecific, **M**easurable, **A**ttainable, **R**elevant, and **T**ime-Bound.



Teamwork makes the dream work! Consider collaborating with another organization to create a successful event. In the past, grantees have collaborated with local public health departments, news stations, and health advocates.

2022 EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

TMA Medical Student Section chapters received six of the 18 Local Impact Grants with amounts up to \$3,500.

The UT Health San Antonio chapter hosted a COVID vaccination clinic for underserved and non-English speaking communities in the area.

Other events hosted by TMA medical student chapters were a back-to-school childhood vaccination clinic in Spring and a human papillomavirus vaccination event series in Lubbock.

The Spring Branch Community Healthcare

Center in Houston hosted a Back-to-School Vaccine and School Supply Drive throughout the month of August for children and teens aged 5-18 years in the Spring Branch and Northwest Houston areas. This program offered vaccines against a variety of diseases such as measles, mumps, polio, whooping cough, and diphtheria.

Spring Branch community health workers administered free vaccines regardless of insurance status. This ensured students were able to satisfy the vaccination requirements of school districts in order to attend classes.

A log-in is required for the IMA Foundation grant portal. Applicants only need to apply once per grant cycle. Funding cannot be used to reimburse for previously held events or activities, so applicants should apply in advance of program or event start date (if program or event is grant-dependent). Grantees have up to 12 months from receipt to use all awarded funds.

*If you have not previously applied for a grant, you may need to create an account. This portal is different from your TMA website log-in.
